■ There are around 1,300 veteran trees in Richmond Park recorded on the Ancient Tree Inventory, and around 320 of these are ancient. One of the most impressive of these is the Royal Oak, which is estimated to be around 750 years old.

Pembroke Lodge

The Lodge is first mentioned in 1754, when it was a one-roomed cottage occupied by a molecatcher. He was employed to eradicate molehills that were impeding the sport of deer hunting. The cottage was enlarged to become a house with four principal rooms and was renamed Hill Lodge.

4. Fungi

Funghi

- About 80% of all plants grow in such a "mutual association' with fungi.
- The mushrooms and toadstools you see in the park are the 'fruiting bodies' of these underground fungi. They are vitally important to the reproduction of the fungi and they also provide food and habitat for numerous insects and other animals.





5. Isabella Plantation

- The Isabella Plantation is a 40 acre woodland garden set within a plantation it is best known for its evergreen azaleas, which line the ponds and streams and at their peak of flower in late April and early May.

Isabella Plantation

- The Isabella Plantation is a 40 acre woodland garden set within a Victorian woodland plantation planted in the 1830's.
- Part of the parklands conservation designation is as a Site of Special Scientific Interest, the site is managed very much with nature in mind and the gardens are run on organic principles. Native plants commonly grow alongside exotics throughout the Plantation.



7 Birdspotting

- Did you know there are over 140 recorded species of bird in Richmond Park.
- Can you name this one?
- Lesser Spotted Woodpecker

If you are lucky you may spot some of these birds

- Woodland birds include all 3 woodpeckers (the Park may be one of the best sites in London for Lesser Spotted Woodpecker with up to 5 breeding pairs), Stock Dove, Tawny Owl, Blackcap, Common Chiffchaff, a few Garden Warblers, Nuthatch and Treecreeper.
- Jackdaws and Ring-necked Parakeets are the two most obvious species in the Park.





8 Bats

- Since Richmond Park is so vast and has so many trees (over 100, 000), it is a really important area for bats.

There are 17 species of bat in the UK, of which 11 can be supported in Richmond Park. Protecting the park's trees and plants is vital to these bats.

Recent sightings include brown long-eared bats, Daubenton's bats, serotine bats, noctule bats and all of the 3 species of pipistrelle bats.
